




60% of child sexual abuse is perpetrated by an aquaintance



THE RESEARCH

The Nature and Scope of Educator Misconduct in k-12 (2023)

11.7% of high school graduates reported sexual misconduct by an educator

Teachers were the most common perpetrator (63%) followed by coaches and gym teachers (20%)

Praesidium 2025 Report

Child sexual abuse incidents occurred most frequently in bathroom s/locker rooms (18%) and classrooms (22%)



PREVENTION IN PRACTICE

Prevention is not a one-time event.

Prevention requires a commitment
by all adults to create a culture of
safety within an organization.





POLICIES THAT PROTECT

SCREENING

How are staff, volunteers, and visitors screened prior to contact with youth? Is everyone held to the same standard?

INTERACTIONS

Are all interactions including on line observable or
interruptible? Are there
clear guidelines on
appropriate and
inappropriate contact?

REPORTING

Are reporting procedures clear and compliant with state law? How do employees, youth, and parents report concerns to leadership?

CODE OF CONDUCT

Agood code of conduct clearly establishes acceptable and unacceptable behaviors with youth and their families



- High fives, daps
- Praise for achievements
- Group communication



USE CAUTION

- Attending personal events
- Gifts for specific children
- Rough-housing



PROHIBITED

- Comments about someone's body
- Leaving a child unsupervised
- Inappropriate jokes





WHAT'S THE PLAN?

- Organizational policies and procedures
- Evidence-informed child abuse prevention and response for all staff
- Include parents/caregivers and youth
- Repeat training annually
- Review &revise your organizational training plan each year

SUPERVISION

YOUTH

- Adult-to-child rations
- Vulnerable areas
- Building entrance/exit

STAFF AND VOLUNTEERS

- Regular supervision
- Unscheduled drop-ins
- Transportation

VISITORS

• How are visitors monitored while in the building?



SIGN UP FOR STEWARDS OF CHILDREN

RESPONDING TO CONCERNS AND ALLEGATIONS

BOUNDARY VIOLATIONS

How do staff, volunteers, parents/caregivers, and youth report concerns? How does leadership respond to questionable behavior?

REPORTING TO AUTHORITIES

Does the reporting policy comply with state law? What if a report is screened out?



DISCLOSURE PROCESS



Disclosure is a complicated interplay of individual, familial, community, and societal characteristics.

Establishing rapport and providing multiple opportunities for a youth to disclose is vital.





SUPPORTING YOUTH AND FAMILIES

- Protect their privacy
- Do NOT have youth disclose to multiple people
- Do NOT ask for details
- Affirm their decision to tell
- Do NOT conduct your own investigation prior to reporting
- Have a plan in place & communicate
- Prioritize safety
- Have resources available
- Schedule regular check-ins
